Primary purpose

Quantify views of people living with MBC to inform decisions, priorities, and actions

Key inputs

- Literature review
- Key informant interviews
- Extensive involvement of BECOME leadership team and subcommittee
- Expertise of consulting team

Topics

- Demographics and descriptors
- Experience with oncology care team
- Perceptions of clinical trials
- Motivations
- Barriers
- Support needs
- Information needs

Methodology:

Research Phases /Development/ Participant Recruitment

Key Informant Interviews


- In-depth qualitative interviews with a range of vantage points
- 13 Black people living with MBC

Participants

- 8 clinicians
- 4 hospital/academic research administrators
- 4 breast cancer researchers
- 2 payers (insurance)

Topics

- Considerations and Barriers
- Support and Information
- Recruitment




Survey Development

- Drafted by CBWhite using inputs lit review, 2019 survey, key informant interviews, and BECOME and MBCA experiences and objectives
- Reviewed by six beta testers and principal investigator identified by MBCA
- Revised based on feedback and input

Next Steps

- MBCA submitted to North Star Review Board
- Programmed for online administration
- Paper version created by MBCA for those requesting it



Final Report

Patient-led research found

8 out of 10 Black women and men living with metastatic breast cancer would consider participating in clinical trials.





67%

of Black women and men living with MBC want information about clinical trials from a person with same racial or ethnic identity



Ensure Access>

64%

of Black women and men living with MBC have difficulty finding clinical trials



Address Concerns>

32_%

of Black women and men living with MBC believe treatment during clinical trials will be fair and equal
